

Dear Sir:-

Replying to your favor of Dec. 9th, as to further details with dates and places and character of electrical and engineering work done by me, beg to say that, as Resident Engineer of Anderson Water Light & Power Company, Anderson, S. C., during 1897 I had charge of hydraulic and electrical construction including design and construction of transmission lines. While there I erected and put in service two 11,000 volt Stanley Generators, which, at that time, were the first machines to actually operate at 11,000 volts.

From October 1898 to March 1903 I was with the Columbus Power Company, Columbus, Ga., first as Resident Engineer, having in charge the construction of the hydro-electric development, and later as Chief Engineer, having in charge the construction of the transmission lines, etc., and operation of this plant.

From March 1903 to present date as Chief Engineer of the Catawba Power Company, I completed the hydro-electric development of 8,000 KW, designed and built in the neighborhood of 100 miles of transmission lines with necessary sub-stations, for the total output and designed most of the electric drives for the mills using the power of this plant.

In June of this year I was made Chief Engineer of the Southern Power Company, which Company acquired the Catawba Power Company and purchased nine additional water powers with an aggregate of 125,000 H.P.

It is the intention to weave these various plants into one large system which will feed the various towns and cities in this district, and I am in immediate charge of all construction and design. The development of the first of these plants, which will give us 24,000 KW, was commenced in July and contracts have been let for both the hydraulic and electric equipment.





Replying to your favor of the 12th inst., I beg to hand you enclosed map showing the territory being covered by the Electric Company for which Mr. W. S. Lee is Vice President and Chief Engineer. I have on several occasions visited Charlotte vicinity while this work was in progress and have gone fully into what is being done and can state from personal knowledge that Mr. Lee has carried all of the engineering work for this concern and has either designed or supervised the designing of the details of this work throughout. He has been Chief Engineer in fact as well as name and deserves full credit for all that has been accomplished. The details of these developments are as follows:

There is being completed at the present time the hydraulic work and installation of the electrical end of the Great Falls station, which will consist of 8 - 3000 K. W. Generators, with necessary details such as, step-up transformers etc. etc. This plant will transmit power at 44000 volts to the various cotton mills and other power consumers within 100 miles of

Mr. Lee has also purchased apparatus for another plant of the same size, which he is beginning construction of, and has purchased apparatus for a third plant in which is to be installed 6 - 3000 K.W. machines.

In addition to this work, he has in operation under him the Catawba Power Company's plant, from which he is now distributing some 10,000 horse power.

This is the largest work that has ever been undertaken in this part of the country, and Mr. Lee's ability to carry it through is based on the record he has made in connection with his past work and the equipment under his charge, and I think you will find that he is in every way entitled to be raised to the rank of full member of the Institute.

I would conclude by saying that I consider Mr. Lee a strong man personally and technically and the right kind of tember for full membership. Yours truly,



In connection with the re-consideration by the Board of Mr. W. S. Lee's application for full membership in the Institute, I beg you to refer to my remarks on the floor at the last meeting of the Beard of Directors, and suggest that particular attention be paid by the Board to the question of dates in connection with Mr. Lee's experience. As you will recall, as a member of the Board of Directors, I asked for the papers in this case, and after looking through them thoroughly was unable to discover other reason for action of the Board of Examiners than a certain letter from one of our prominent engineers; the persual of which letter gave a very good reason for the action of the Board. I would call attention to the fact, however, that the time elapsing between the date at which Mr. Lee was connected with the gentleman who wrote the letter and the present time at which he made application for transfer, amounts to something over four years, and many of us have practically made ourselves as electrical engineers, so far as reputation is concerned, within, that length of time. I believe if this point



Your letter of the 19th inst to hand and I take pleasure in filling out the blank which you send, but I do not feel that it will do you any good. I think that I have written to you several times in reference to the condition of the Atlanta Branch of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, and I am sure that in the interview that I had with Pres. Sheldon and Sec. Pope in New York last January, I made the situation pretty clear to them.

In a nutshell, I may say that the Atlanta Branch of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers is practically dead. We started out under very favorable circumstances and got about forty-five members from all over the South. After meetings had been held for about one year and quite a number of original papers presented, some three or four of the members of the Atlanta Branch, then associates in the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, made application for transfer to full membership. These applications, without a single exception I think, were turned down and in the case of at least one of the applicants, whose place of residence is not Atlanta, and whose experience and practice has been very extensive, I feel that the board made a mistake.

On account of the fact that it appeared that it was not likely that any of the associates in and around Atlanta, would ever be allowed to become full members, the interest began to lag; we were unable to get new members as they felt that they would remain associates in the Institute for the remainder of their lives, no matter how much work they did or how well known they became in the South.

As you see from the report, we have not had a meeting here in over a year and I doubt very seriously, if we will ever have another meeting unless the associate members of the Institute in this locality can be convinced that they will be transferred to full membership if they reach a standard that members in other sections of the Country reach when they are transferred. In other words, we realize fully here that we are somewhat out of the "family circle"; the work that we do and the references that we furnish are, of course, necessarily unknown, to a certain extent, to the board of examiners and unless the board of examiners will give the references furnished by us as much consideration as the references furnished by members in other localities, it is always practically impossible for any member in this section to be transferred.

As mentioned above, I talked these facts over fully with Pres. Sheldon and Mr. Pope in January. Mr. A.M. Schoen also has had quite a talk with Mr. Sheldon and Mr. Pope and they have received a letter, I understand from Mr. F.M. Laxton who is also connected with the Atlanta Branch. These interviews and letter no

doubt, make the matter perfectly plain to the executive officers and as I have above mentioned, as the matter now stands, the Atlanta Branch is practically a thing of the past.

I have gone into this matter very fully with you as I wish you as Chairman of the Committee on Local Organizations to know the state of affairs here. You may feel sure that Mr. Schoen and I stand ready to do anything for the Institute that is within our power, but candidly, at present I see no future for the American Insittute in Atlanta as far as the local branch is ∞ n-cerned.
