

Does the Institute still furnish such complete sets, or has it run out of them. What price do you think I could get for them.


I will soon have to move my office and am therefore condensing things before moving.



In Mr. Hutchinson's absence I am answering your letter to him of November 9, in reference to the offer which you received from Mr. Grant for the purchase of your set of the Transactions.

As I believe I mentioned to you in a previous letter, we have been anable to furnish complete sets of the Transactions, as we have no copies of the Volumes I, III, V, VI, IX, XVII and XVIII. The remaining volumes as called for have been charged for at the regular price quoted in the Institute By-laws, viz. \$10 for the paper binding and \$11.50 for the cloth. Compared to the Institute prices, Mr. Grant's offer would show up poorly, and it is my recollection that during a call at this office he expressed his willingness to pay at least \$100 in order to obtain the first ten volumes of the Transactions.

We have received so few inquiries for complete sets of the Transactions that I believe that if Mr. Grant would increase his offer to the figure originally mentioned it might be as well to dispose of the volum s at this time. You have the alternative, however, of inserting an announcement in the classified advertising section of the Institute Jou nal, the cost of which would be 40g per line, with a minimum of five lines averaging about seven words.


