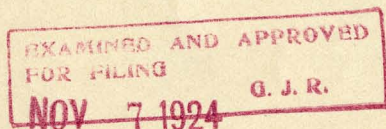
Dear Mr. McCalfe,

Dear Mr. Metcalfe,

Could you tell me, quite roughly only, about how many of the papers & discussions which are printed in the monthly journal, are finally included in the bound transactions. I mean, in proportion; is it more than half or less; taking 1923 as an example.

I assume that in the bound volume they are reprinted exactly as they appeared in the monthly publication, & are not cut or abbreviated or altered in any way. Am I right?

In your bound volume there is no cross reference to the monthly journal in which they first appeared. Hence when I publish references to my paper, I must give both, as many (especially abroad) have the journal but not the transactions.

Would it not be wise to add to each paper & discussion the reference to the journal (month & year only) in which they had first appeared?

Dear Dr. Hering:-

Replying to your letter of November 5th, the amount of material published in the Journal and excluded from the corresponding year's Transactions is very small. In 1933 there were probably about ten articles of more or less ephemeral interest left out of the Transactions, and these would amount to less than ten per cent of the total material. I do not, of course, include the very short contributions which may be classed as fillers. In general, for many years back there has been 90 per cent or more of the regular meeting papers which have appeared in the Journal published in the Transactions. These papers are not cut or abbreviated in any way for the Transactions, but are occasionally subject to slight corrections, generally of a typographical nature.

We have found it advisable to limit references to the Transactions only where papers appear in the Transactions. This for the reason that so many of our members do not seem to appreciate the distinction between the Journal, the Transactions and the Proceedings, which latter were discontinued five years ago. We are constantly receiving references to the Proceedings or the Journal when the Transactions are meant, and vice versa. As the Transactions are the final and permanent records, we always use them for reference when possible, as we believe it avoids some confusion.
